This questionnaire is intended for a close relative or friend of the study participant (called the “informant”). It should be filled in without consulting the study participant. The answers should be based only on the informant’s impression and should not be influenced by the study participant’s suggestions.

Now we want you to remember what the study participant was like 10 years ago and to compare it with what he/she is like now. Below are situations where this person has to use his/her memory or intelligence and we want you to indicate whether this has improved, stayed the same, or got worse in that situation over the last 10 years. Note the importance of comparing his/her present performance with 10 years ago. So if 10 years ago this person always forgot where he/she left things and he/she still does, then this would be considered “hasn’t changed much.” Please indicate the changes you have observed by putting a tick in the appropriate box.
